Bond site loses wetlands status

Seventy-two hecrares of coastal wetlands owned by the Bond Corporation — which hopes to build a multi-million-dollar resort on it — has been wiped from State Government preservation maps.

NSW North Coast environmentalists accused the State Government yesterday of "helping out its mates" in deleting an area with high conservation value from its coastal wetland planning policy.

But both the Bond Corporation and a spokesman for the NSW Minister for Planning and Environment, Mr Carr, rejected the criticism and claimed the land was not worth protecting.

Under current State laws, proposals to develop land classified under the wetlands policy must undergo tough environmental impact studies.

Freeing the Bond land, known as north Ocean Shores, from the policy helps clear the way for a major development on the site.

The land, owned by Austmark International Ltd, an associate company of the Bond empire, is south of Byron Bay and north of the present Ocean Shores development.


Austmark has submitted plans to Byron Shire Council and the Department of Environment and Planning to build a \$350 million resort and retirement village inside a complete town on 300 hectares.

The wetland area, which includes another 23 hectares not owned by Austmark, was originally protected in the State Environmental Planning Policy No 14 gazetted in December 1985.

But a revision of the 1,300 classified areas last month saw the 95 hectares of coastal wetland dropped from the policy.

A local environmentalist, Ms Elizabeth Smith, claimed yesterday that the decision was politically motivated and the Government was "helping out its mates".

The president of the North Coast Environment Council, Mr



Terry Parkhouse, claimed the area was valuable and should not be excluded from protection.

The State Opposition MP for Clarence, Mr Ian Causley, said local developers often had their proposals knocked back by councils and the Government, yet the Bond Corporation virtually had a clear path ahead of its proposal.

The Bond Corporation's Queensland property manager, Mr Brian Orr, who controls the site, said the area was not actually wetlands.

He told the *Herald* that independent environmental studies had shown it had a very high degree of salt and was in fact grasslands.

"It never really was wetlands and shouldn't have been included in the policy in the first place," he said.

This statement was backed up by a spokesman for Mr Carr, who said a recent revision had shown that 33 hectares of the land was non-wetland cypress pine and old marsh pastures.

The other 62 hectares contained very recent casuarina (a type of tree) regrowth, sedge (a grasslike plant) and grazing land.
